ABOUT FAMU

Founded October 3, 1887, Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU), commonly known as Florida A&M University, is a public, historically black university in Tallahassee, Florida. What distinguishes FAMU from other universities is its legacy of providing access to a high-quality, affordable education with programs and services that guide students toward successfully achieving their dreams. FAMU is part of the State University System of Florida and is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges.

In addition to the main Tallahassee campus, FAMU has several satellite campuses across Florida. These include the College of Law in Orlando and the College of Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Sciences, Institute of Public Health, which has sites in Crestview, Tampa, Jacksonville, and Miami.

Brief History of the University

Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University, founded on October 3, 1887, as the State Normal College for Colored Students, began classes with 15 students and two instructors. FAMU's destiny was to become an institution of higher learning, striving toward even greater heights of academic excellence. Today, Florida A&M University is one of 12 Florida State University System institutions and "Excellence with Caring" remains its goal.

For more than 130 years, FAMU has served the citizens of the State of Florida and the nation through its provision of preeminent educational programs, programs that were the building blocks of a legacy of academic excellence with caring. FAMU, "Florida's Opportunity University," is committed to meeting the challenges and needs of future generations.

Two distinguished citizens and educators led the State Normal College through its infancy. They were Thomas DeSaille Tucker, an outstanding attorney from Pensacola who was selected as the college's first president, and Thomas Van Renssalaer Gibbs, a state representative from Duval County who was Tucker's top assistant. In 1891, the college received \$7,500 under the Second Morrill Act for agricultural and mechanical arts education; thus, it became Florida's land grant institution for Black people.

In the 1900s, this young institution flourished under the leadership of Nathan B. Young. In 1905, the college management was transferred from the Board of Education to the Board of Control. This event was significant because it officially designated the college as an institution of higher education. The name was changed in 1909 to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College for Negroes (FAMC). The following year, with an enrollment of 317 students, the college awarded its first degrees.

Under the administration of John Robert Edward Lee, Sr., FAMC acquired much of the physical and academic image it has today. Buildings were constructed; more land was

purchased; additional faculty were hired; courses were upgraded, and accreditation was received from several state agencies. By 1944, Florida A&M College had constructed 48 buildings, accumulated 396 acres of land, and had 812 students and 122 staff members.

Perhaps the most outstanding achievement under the presidency of Dr. George W. Gore, Jr. (1950-1968) was the elevation of the school to university status. In 1953, the college's name and status were changed by legislative action from Florida Agricultural and Mechanical College to Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University.

With Dr. Benjamin L. Perry, Jr., at the helm, the 1970s brought further growth to the University. FAMU experienced a decade of rapid transition when federal laws demanded a desegregated unitary system. Dr. Perry's administration is credited with the preservation of FAMU's autonomy. In 1971, FAMU was recognized as a full partner in Florida's nine-university public higher education system.

The 1980s served as a model for productive development. Under the administration of Dr. Walter L. Smith, the University grew to 11 schools and colleges and a division of graduate studies, research, and continuing education. In 1984, the University was granted the authority to offer its first Doctor of Philosophy degree, the Ph.D. in Pharmacology.

In 1985, the construction of a new corridor of history began as Dr. Frederick S. Humphries became the eighth president of FAMU. Under his leadership, FAMU experienced significant growth and unsurpassed accomplishments. Dr. Humphries' unique administrative initiatives heightened the appeal for FAMU to high school students, parents, and other members of the public. By 1992, total enrollment had nearly doubled to 9,551. The enrollment for the 1998-1999 academic year reached approximately 12,000. In addition to increased enrollment, during this era, the University consistently ranked nationally among the top five colleges and universities for enrolling National Achievement finalists. Due to an aggressive and competitive campaign to attract more talented students, FAMU climbed steadily from fourth place in 1989 to first place (1992, 1995, and 1997), and second place (1993 and 1994), surpassing institutions such as Harvard, Yale, and Stanford in enrollment of National Achievement finalists. Most significantly, during the celebration of its 110th Anniversary, TIME Magazine-Princeton Review selected Florida A&M University as the 1997-98 College of the Year.

The legacy of leadership continued into the new millennium. On May 17, 2002, the Board of Trustees named Fred Gainous, Ed. D., an alum, the ninth president of FAMU. In February 2007, James Ammons, Ph.D., was named the 10th president of Florida A&M University. Dr. Ammons served as provost and vice president for Academic Affairs for FAMU from October 1995 until becoming chancellor of North Carolina Central University in 2001. Dr. Ammons commenced his presidency at Florida A&M University on July 2, 2007. President Elmira Mangum, Ph.D., began her tenure as the 11th president of FAMU on April 1, 2014, and was the first woman appointed to this position of distinction.

In November 2017, Larry Robinson, Ph.D., became the 12th president of Florida A&M University. In 2019-2020, FAMU experienced another period of unprecedented construction with the completion of the 700-bed FAMU Towers residence hall, the Center for Access and Student Success (CASS)

student services complex, and an outdoor amphitheater. Under Dr. Robinson's leadership, FAMU continues to thrive and has implemented new recruitment and retention strategies, strengthened the University's academic programs, and more.

Mission, Vision and Values

Mission

Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU) is an 1890 land-grant institution dedicated to the advancement of knowledge, resolution of complex issues and the empowerment of citizens and communities. The University provides a student-centered environment consistent with its core values. The faculty is committed to educating students at the undergraduate, graduate, doctoral and professional levels, preparing graduates to apply their knowledge, critical thinking skills and creativity in their service to society. FAMU's distinction as a doctoral/research institution will continue to provide mechanisms to address emerging issues through local and global partnerships. Expanding upon the University's land-grant status, it will enhance the lives of constituents through innovative research, engaging cooperative extension, and public service. While the University continues its historic mission of educating African Americans, FAMU embraces persons of all races, ethnic origins and nationalities as life-long members of the University community.

Vision

Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU) will be recognized as a premier land-grant, doctoral-research university that produces globally competitive graduates.

Achieving this vision requires the University to provide students with an educational experience that allows them to compete in the 21st century global economy. Today's students are interested in becoming entrepreneurs and innovators. They are not just interested in getting a job, but addressing social issues and providing transformational solutions to world and community problems. At FAMU, we are enhancing our status as a first-choice institution that students will pay for and in which donors will invest. We will create strategies and choices to accomplish this, using six guiding principles: quality, integrity, transparency, accountability, core values, and outstanding customer service.

Governing Bodies

FAMU Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees governs the University and consists of thirteen members. The Governor appoints six trustees, and five trustees are appointed by the Florida Board of Governors, subject to confirmation by the Florida Senate. The Faculty Senate and Student Government Association Presidents, appointed by their bodies, serve a one-year term on the Board of Trustees. The other Trustees are appointed for staggered terms of five years.

As the governing body of the University, the Board of Trustees is charged with policymaking for the University. Trustees serve without compensation and meet at least quarterly. The officers of the Board of Trustees are the chair and vice-chair. Each is elected for a term of two years and may be reelected for one additional consecutive term. The president serves as the corporate secretary to the Board of Trustees. The president has the responsibility for the day-to-day management of the University. For this reason, one of the Board of Trustees' most important responsibilities is the president's selection, retention, and replacement.

The Florida Board of Governors serves as the governing body for the State University System of Florida, which includes all public universities in the state of Florida, including FAMU.


The Board of Governors is comprised of seventeen members, fourteen of whom are appointed by the Florida Governor and confirmed by the Florida Senate for a term of seven years. The remaining members include the Chair of the Advisory Council of Faculty Senates, the Commissioner of Education, and the Chair of the Florida Student Association. The Board oversees the operation and management of the Florida public university system's 12 institutions.

Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC)

Florida Agricultural & Mechanical University (FAMU) is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) to award baccalaureate, masters, professional, and doctorate degrees. Accreditation serves as a vital tool in maintaining accountability and transparency at Florida A&M University. It ensures that the University and the programs that are offered meet quality benchmarks and uphold standards of excellence. By undergoing rigorous internal and external reviews, FAMU has the opportunity to identify areas of improvement and enhance the overall educational experience for our students.

Accreditation by SACSCOC is a statement of the institution's continuing commitment to integrity and its capacity to provide effective programs and services based on agreed-upon accreditation standards. Florida A&M University has been accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) since 1935. FAMU was last reaffirmed in 2018. Its next reaffirmation is scheduled in 2028, with a mid-review cycle in in 2024.

Figure 1: Total Applications Status Overview




Figure 2: Total Admit Rate and Yield Rate





Figure 3: Historical Enrollment



Figure 4: Fall 2021 Enrollment by State of Residence



Figure 5: Fall 2021 Enrollment by Florida County of Residence



Figure 6: Fall 2021 Undergraduate Enrollment Overview



Figure 7: Fall 2021 Graduate Enrollment Overview



Figure 9: First Time in College Enrollment Overview



Figure 10: Fall 2021 FTIC Enrollment by State of Residence



Figure 11: FTIC Fall 2021 Enrollment by Florida County of Residence








Figure 12: Historical Full-time FTIC Fall to Fall Retention Rates





Figure 13: Full-time FTIC Four-Year Graduation Rates



Figure 15: 2021-2022 Degrees Awarded by College/School by Number




Figure 16: 2021-2022 Degrees Awarded by College/School by Percent





Figure 17: 2021-2022 Operating Revenue by Category




Figure 18: Operating Revenues



Figure 19: 2021-2022 Operating Expenditures by Category




Figure 20: Operating Expenditures




