# Direct Support Organizations (DSO) and Athletics Committee Minutes Trustee Deveron Gibbons, Chair Monday, May 13, 2024

Trustee Deveron Gibbons called the meeting to order. Trustees Natlie Figgers, Loryn May, Belvin Perry, Jr., Kenward Stone, Nicole Washington and Michael White were in attendance and established a quorum. Trustees John Crossman and Kelvin Lawson were not in attendance.

BOT Chair Harper was recognized to make a statement to the Committee. She respectfully requested to defer any discussion at this meeting of the gift announcement made at Commencement earlier this month, since this topic would be discussed at the full board meeting scheduled for Wednesday, May 15th. Trustee Gibbons responded that there was no planned discussion on that topic for this meeting.

Dr. Robinson provided the Committee with an update on the campus in light of the recent storms. He stated that two (2) tornadoes struck the Leon County area with one (1) directly impacting the University campus causing damages to buildings and power lines as well as debris from trees and tree limbs. Campus clean-up efforts were underway, and the campus is closed this week for Summer school sessions A&C.

Provost Watson added that many students, faculty and staff do not have power and their assignments can be accessed through CANVAS, however, faculty need to be flexible with students during this time and allow sufficient time for them to make-up any missed assignments. The University is also preparing for another storm and the Lawson Center is being used as a shelter for the community. Dr. Robinson relayed that the main campus's power has been restored. Chair Harper thanked Dr. Robinson and the Leadership Team for acting swiftly around response to the storm.

The FAMU-FSU College of Engineering would like to respectfully request the Advisory Committee on Honorary Naming of Facilities and Programs to consider and provide guidance regarding the following proposal to rename the Challenger Learning Center's Planetarium to the Fogg Planetarium.

As the K-12 Outreach arm of the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering, the Challenger Learning Center provides community engagement and enrichment to over 50,000 students annually through field trips, summer camps and community engagement programs. This facility, while managed by FSU, is a vital part of the Joint College and makes a considerable impact at not only the Engineering College, but also across the broader FAMU community.

In December 2023, the Challenger Learning Center was notified that we were the recipients of a five-year gift commitment totaling \$750,000 from the Edward C Fogg and Lisbeth A. Fogg Charitable Trust. This is the single largest philanthropic contribution to the Challenger Learning Center in its 20-year history. The pledged commitment will provide \$150,000 funding to make minor renovations to the planetarium and the remaining \$600,000 will be contributed to the Challenger Learning Center's General Endowment fund to support programming.

Typically contributions of this nature allow for the naming of a space within a facility as determined by the FAMU Foundation, Inc. as they are the fiduciary arm that accepts contribution on behalf of FAMU. In this instance, the funds were received by the Florida State University (FSU) Foundation, the fiduciary for our other affiliated university's philanthropic contributions. Funds were directed to that university due to the donor's affiliation with FSU. The College similarly anticipates other gifts will be directed through the FAMU Foundation from donors with an affiliation with FAMU.

In the spirit of fostering strong collaboration between both universities, we are respectfully asking the FAMU Board of Trustees to endorse the naming of the Challenger Learning Center Planetarium the Fogg Planetarium just as we will similarly request that the FSU Foundation and FSU Board endorse naming proposals made by the FAMU Foundation in recognition of major gifts made in support of FAMU-FSU

College of Engineering spaces, including the Challenger Learning Center. Both FAMU and FSU Foundations have defined major gifts for purposes of naming opportunities by using a calculation that factors visibility, size, cost of construction or renovation, etc. to establish minimums. We are requesting reciprocity between the two organizations for the purposes of endorsing naming opportunities.

As the nation's only Joint College, it is imperative that we leverage the strengths and opportunities afforded by our partnership with both FAMU and FSU. We are humbly asking that we begin that process by acknowledging and supporting this honorary naming that benefits not only our College of Engineering faculty and students, but that also directly impacts our community and region through the provision of critically needed K12 STEM outreach programs as well as community engagement programming.

and

# the Florida State University Foundation Inc.

to name the

#### Fogg Planetarium at the Challenger Learning Center

#### I. INTRODUCTION

For the purpose of making a charitable gift, this Agreement is entered into on the day and date last signed below by and among Edward C. Fogg, III and Lisbeth A. Fogg Charitable Trust (Donor), Florida State University for and on behalf of the Florida State University Board of Trustees (University) and the Florida State University Foundation Inc. (Donee), a not-for-profit corporation located in Tallahassee, Florida, to name the **Fogg Planetarium at the Challenger Learning Center**.

#### II. PURPOSE

- A. The Donor is committing \$750,000 to name the Fogg Planetarium at the Challenger Learning Center.
- B. This gift will provide much-needed support for the Challenger Learning Center Fund (F02725) and the Challenger Learning Center Endowment Fund (F07719).
- C. This gift is subject to the University's Campus Naming Policy.

#### III. SCHEDULE AND FORM OF CONTRIBUTION

A. The Donor will most generously gift \$750,000 on or before December 31, 2027.

The Donor will contribute \$750,000 according to the following schedule:

\$150,000 on or before December 31, 2023 (F02725)

\$150,000 on or before December 31, 2024 (F07719)

\$150,000 on or before December 31, 2025 (F07719)

\$150,000 on or before December 31, 2026 (F07719)

\$150,000 on or before December 31, 2027 (F07719)

- B. The Donor may contribute the total gift amount at any time before the last date on the schedule.
- C. The Donor and others have the right to make additional gifts to the Donee for inclusion in the fund, possibly changing the named space in the future.

#### IV. ADMINISTRATION

- A. The dean of the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering will be charged with administering the fund following the Purpose noted in this Agreement.
- B. Modifications to this Agreement may be requested by the Donor, as needed, to meet the expressed intent of this fund. Any proposed modifications must be in writing and agreed to by all parties to this Agreement.
- C. If the fund cannot be used for the Purpose stated in this Agreement, the provost of the University reserves the right to redirect the use of the fund for a similar purpose most closely aligned with the Donor's original intention. The University will make reasonable efforts to contact the Donor or current Trustees of the Donor regarding the change, but the provost retains the ultimate decision to redirect the use.
- D. If consideration of any of the foregoing criteria shall be determined to be legally impermissible for whatever reason by the decision of a court of competent jurisdiction binding on the University, then such criteria shall be eliminated from this document with the remainder of the document left intact, as long as the Donor's original intent is not substantially changed, and the deleted text shall have no further force or effect. Thereafter, this Agreement shall be administered based on the remaining criteria.
- E. This naming is contingent upon approval by the Board of Trustees. Additional verbiage and approvals unique to the FAMU-FSU College of Engineering naming opportunities may be required.

#### V. RECOGNITION

- A. The Donor will be recognized by naming the **Fogg Planetarium at the Challenger Learning**Center, which shall serve as a tribute to their vision and commitment.
- B. The Donor shall be acknowledged in accordance with the policies of the Donee. This recognition may include appearances in press releases and features in printed and electronic communications.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

The following requirements apply to all Florida State University campuses, all satellite facilities and programs, all direct support organizations and governs the naming of academic units, non-academic units, physical structures or parts of physical structures, administrative positions, faculty positions, excellence funds, athletic coaching positions, scholarships, fellowships, internships, and lectureships and all other endowed funds.

Academic units include academic programs, centers, institutes, departments, schools and colleges. Physical structures include buildings, building additions, collections of buildings, monuments, statutes or sculptures depicting actual persons, fields, open-air courtyards, streets, alleys, and other outdoor areas. The Florida State University Naming Opportunities Guidelines shall govern portions of buildings (such as classrooms, auditoriums, foyers, libraries).

Any name recommended for consideration under these guidelines must be one that would bring distinction or honor to the University and must be consistent with the values, mission and traditions of the University.

These policies shall be applicable for all naming opportunities, regardless of whether the donor is an individual, corporation, foundation, or other organization.

#### **Definition of Terms:**

President President of Florida State University.

Vice President Vice President for University Advancement and President,

FSU Foundation

Unit Head Dean or director of an academic unit reporting to the Provost,

dean or head of a satellite campus, president or head of a direct support organization, vice presidents of the University, president

of the student body.

Committee The Committee on Campus Names

Nameable Space A structure or space that may bear the name of

an honoree.

Philanthropic Cost Total fundraising goal of a project.

#### II. POLICY

#### A. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. When a naming opportunity is presented, strong preference shall be given to persons who have had long, close and valued associations with the University as teachers, administrators, or distinguished and supportive alumni and friends. The following factors shall also be considered in approving recognition of any person, living or dead:
- a. Is a prominent legacy of the namesake (honoree) fundamentally at odds with the current values or the mission of the University?
- b. Was the relevant prominent legacy significantly contested in the time in which the namesake lived or was most active?
- c. Does the building or other recognition play a substantial role in constructing or dismantling community at the University?
- 2. Donor recognition does not need to be tied directly to a gift for a specific building or improvement, academic unit or endowment. Donors who support such projects may make their gifts "unrestricted" to the university or to the unit responsible for the private fund-raising, while being recognized for the gift by naming an available space. Significant unrestricted gifts can be recognized through naming opportunities.
- 3. If fundraising exceeds the philanthropic costs, the additional funds may be applied toward programmatic initiatives within the unit.
- 4. Donors should fulfill pledges in five years or less. Naming will be considered when 50 percent of a pledge is received. A lower percentage of pledge fulfillment or a longer period can be granted in cases where a written gift agreement is binding on the donor's estate and based on the previous giving history of the donor.
- 5. Once a building, program, or endowment has been named, the name shall not be changed unless there are unusual or compelling reasons for changing the name with a strong preference toward maintaining a name or recognition. The University, through the sole and absolute discretion of its Board of Trustees, may exercise this option if a designated name, in the President's judgment, should bring discredit upon the University. Failure to complete a pledge shall constitute a valid reason for changing the name. In the event of such re-naming, the University shall have no financial responsibility to the donor or to the academic unit, despite anything that may be stated or implied to the contrary. Factors to be considered in such decision include:
- a. Did the University, at the time of a naming, honor a namesake for reasons that are fundamentally at odds with the current values or mission of the University?
- b. Were the reason(s) provided as justification for honoring the namesake reasonably substantiated based on the records and information available at the time? Since then,

- have new records of relevance been discovered that discredited, contextualized, and/or
- c. Shed new light on the information previously available and/or the justification for the recognition? Given that history, do the contributions of the namesake to the University justify the recognition that currently exists?
  - d. Is the honorific recognition of the namesake having a significantly adverse impact on members of our current University community or the community at large?
  - e. Does the way the recognition is currently being displayed provide sufficienthistorical contextualization to advance the University's educational mission?
- 6. At no time should promises or commitments regarding naming be made in advance of final approval by the appropriate University entities.
- 7. Exceptions to this policy may be made only by the President of Florida State University, with final approval from its Board of Trustees.
- 8. The Florida State University Naming Policy shall follow all statutory requirements (current statue: s. 267.062. F.S.).

#### B. SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS - NAMING PHYSICAL STRUCTURES:

- 1. Where a donor contributes gifts valued at 50% or more of the private philanthropic costs (including governmental and non-governmental matching gifts) associated with a physical structure or more than 50% of the value of an existing facility, or parts thereof, a name suggested by such contributor for that project will be given serious consideration. If for any reason, the matching gift is not received, the donor is responsible for contributing the full 50% of the cost before naming becomes a consideration.
- 2. Where a physical structure already exists or when non-philanthropic funding has already been secured for a new construction project, market benchmarks or other factors shall be used to determine the required contribution for naming.
- 3. Temporary naming of physical structures may be considered based on the length of period of naming and an assessment of market value associated with the structure.
- 4. Colleges and Units that undertake fundraising campaigns to pay for buildings shall develop a list of proposed naming prices for the facility and parts thereof. The list of naming prices must be approved by the Vice President prior to the start of soliciting funds for the building. The proposed naming prices should be submitted with sufficient background information, floor plans, peer benchmark data, etc. to show the rationale for selecting the proposed naming prices.

#### C. SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS - NAMING ACADEMIC UNITS:

1. Where an individual, corporation or foundation contributes significantly to defraying the

- annual operating costs of a program, center, institute, department or college, a name suggested by such contributor for that project will be given serious consideration.
- 2. Market benchmarks and other factors shall be used to determine the required contribution for naming.
- 3. Naming prices for academic units shall require advance approval of the Provost and the Vice President

#### D. SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS-NAMING ENDOWMENTS:

- 1. The permanent endowment of a position is a significant and important investment in the long-term viability and strength of a unit. Gifts that establish these endowments can support either administrative or faculty positions, scholarships, fellowships, etc. In addition to supporting the teaching, research and service activities of the unit, funding may cover research expenses.
- 2. A minimum gift of \$30,000 is required to create an endowed fund [for naming] at Florida State University.
- 3. Minimum endowment amounts do not include matching funds or grants.

  Endowment Levels: Minimums for endowed facilities and positions are maintained in the Florida State University Naming Opportunity Guidelines. Colleges and units may establish additional thresholds above those minimum levels to meet the needs and opportunities of that unit.

#### E. ADMINISTRATION OF THIS POLICY:

- 1. The Vice President shall administer this policy; Development Officers and University officials shall reference the policy, as appropriate in any written agreement or understanding regarding naming.
- 2. A committee, here named The Committee on Campus Names, shall advise the Vice President at the Vice President's discretion
- 3. When appropriate, the President shall forward all positive recommendations to the Board of Trustees for final approval. Notification of naming oppoltunities that do not require Board of Trustee approval will be shared, for information purposes, with the Board annually in the fall during its regularly scheduled meetings. Naming of a physical structure or academic unit must appear as a non-consent item on the Board of Trustees' agenda.
- 4. The naming of a building, road, bridge, park, recreational complex or similar facility for an existing State University System employee or FSU student must receive the additional approval of the Board of Governors following approval by the Board of Trustees.

#### F. PROCEDURES-NAMEABLE SPACE

- 1. Nameable space with a philanthropic cost of \$1 million or greater shall require approval of the Committee on Campus Names, the president, and the Board of Trustees.
- 2. Namable space with a philanthropic cost of \$100,000 to \$999,999 shall require approval of

the Committee on Campus Names and the president except for prominent public spaces which will require Board of Trustee approval. Prominent public spaces are defined as those with high visibility, heavy usage, or those linked to significant University traditions.

- 3. Namable space with a philanthropic cost less than \$100,000 shall require approval of the Unit Head.
- 4. Unit heads will maintain a list of naming opportunities-both available and successfully designated-that are a part of their unit. Unit Heads will update the list at least annually and provide a copy to the Vice President.
- 5. The Vice President will maintain a master list of all naming opportunities with proposed gift amounts and identification of the appropriate approval entity.

#### F. THE COMMITTEE ON CAMPUS NAMES:

When requested by the Vice President, naming proposals may be referred to The Committee on Campus Names. This committee shall be composed of the Vice President for Faculty Development and Advancement (Chair), the Vice President for Finance & Administration, the Provost & Executive Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Senior Associate Vice President for Facilities, an appointee of the Faculty Senate, The Vice President and Director of intercollegiate Athletics or his/her designee, the Vice President for Student Affairs or designee, the President of the Student Body, and an external and an internal member appointed by the President. This external member shall be an alumnus with ethnic or racially diverse background. When so requested, the Committee determines the appropriateness of proposals and prepares recommendations to be considered by the Vice President. Recommendations shall be provided within 30 days of the request for submission to the President.

#### III. LEGAL SUPPORT, JUSTIFICATION, AND REVIEW OF THIS POLICY

Section 267.062, Florida Statutes provides that the Board of Governors shall have primary authority regarding naming of state buildings and other facilities. The Board of Governors has delegated naming authority to the university boards of trustees consistent with BOG Regulation 9.005.

The Vice President shall be responsible for review of the provision of this policy and for making any necessary revisions every three years

#### I. Policy Statement and Purpose

The Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU or University) Board of Trustees establishes the following Policy and Procedures by which any building, structure, road, bridge, park, recreational complex or any tangible property, or any component thereof (hereafter "Facility") or, college, school, department, institute, center, or program (hereafter "Program") or any other property right under the control of the Board of Trustees may be named for an individual or other entity

#### A. Meeting Requirement:

The naming of any Facility or Program requires the recommendation of the President of the University and the approval of the Board of Trustees as a noticed, non-consent agenda item at a meeting of the Board of Trustees.

#### B. <u>Names Prohibited</u>:

No Facility may be named on an honorary basis for any active State University System member, including, but not limited to, staff, faculty, students or trustees. However, a Program may be named for such an active member of the State University System without the approval of the Board of Governors as set forth in sub-paragraph A above.

#### II. Honorary Naming

Non-gift related, or "Honorary", naming of any Facility or Program is reserved for individuals who have been duly recognized for achievements of extraordinary and lasting distinction and who have made a significant contribution to the State of Florida and/or to the University or to the fields of education, government, law, science or the welfare of the human race. The integrity of the individual should exemplify outstanding virtues.

#### A. Establishment of an Advisory Committee on Honorary Naming of Facilities and Programs

The President shall appoint an Advisory Committee on Honorary Naming Facilities and Programs which will review and make recommendations to the President for consideration. Membership shall include the Vice President for University Advancement, who shall Chair the Committee, the Vice President of Administrative and Fiscal Affairs or his/her designee, a representative of the Faculty Senate (but not its president) and a representative of the Student Government Association (but not its president). The President may appoint other members to the Committee as deem appropriate.

#### B. Committee Function

The Committee shall be an advisory body to the President and shall have no policy-making or administrative authority. The Committee shall advise the President with respect to proposals to name or change the name of University Facilities and Programs, consistent with the policy and procedures set forth herein. The Committee shall meet at such times and places required to efficiently perform its duties.

#### III. Gift Related Naming

Gift related naming of a Facility or Program requires a donation to the University or the Florida A&M University Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") which makes a significant contribution to the cost of building the Facility or implementing the Program housed in the facility approved by the Board of Trustees.

Specific naming opportunities and corresponding minimum gift levels are determined by the President, Dean, Vice President of University Advancement, and Vice President of Administrative and Fiscal Affairs or their designee. Naming may be affixed when accompanied by gifts equivalent to at least fifty percent (50%) of the fundraising target.

Naming requests must be accompanied by supporting documentation in the form of a gift agreement which outlines the terms and expectations of the donor.

In all cases, State matching funds may be added to the donor's endowment for purposes of meeting the minimum naming requirement. Such naming recognition will reflect not only the donor's endowment, but also the donor's commitment to the mission, vision and objectives of the University.

#### IV. Matching Gifts

Based on the Alec P. Courtelis University Facility Enhancement Challenge Grant Program, Section 1013.79, Florida Statutes, when the naming opportunity concerns construction of a new building or renovation of an existing building, a donor will be required to provide 100 percent of the private portion of the building or renovation cost. The private portion would be 50 percent of the total construction or renovation cost. If the University chooses to conduct a campaign, which raises the needed private funds from numerous donors, the minimum donation required from an individual for a naming opportunity is 60 percent of the private portion (or, under the existing Alec P. Courtelis University Facility Enhancement Challenge Grant Program, 30 percent of the total cost). These provisions apply only as funding is available.

#### V. Removal, Revocation or Renaming

#### A. <u>Honorary</u>:

At any time, the Board of Trustees may remove a name from and/or rename any Facility or Program named on an honorary basis upon the recommendation of the President of the University and the approval of the Board of Trustees as a noticed, non-consent agenda item at a public meeting of the Board of Trustees. The removal of any name previously requiring the approval of the Board of Governors of the State University System shall likewise require the approval of the Board of Governors.

#### B. Gift Related:

As stated in the gift agreement, at any time, the Board of Trustees may remove a name and or rename a Facility or Program named on a gift related basis when doing so would be in the best interest of the University. The Board of Trustees may consider whether the donor continues to exemplify a commitment to the mission, vision and objectives of the University and whether the donor maintains the integrity consistent with the honor of such naming opportunity. Any altering of previously named Facilities or Programs shall occur in consultation with the donor or his/her designee.

#### C. Revocation:

Revocation of naming approval or conferral – In certain circumstances, the University reserves the right, on reasonable grounds, to revoke and terminate its obligations regarding a naming with no financial responsibility for returning any received contributions to the donor. These actions, and the circumstances that prompt them, may apply to an approved naming that has not yet been acted upon or to a conferred naming and must be outlined in the gift agreement. Following are some (but not all) examples of circumstances warranting renaming, removal or revocation of the naming honor:

1) In situations where University facilities, or any part thereof, has been dedicated to or named for any person, family, or organization, the University reserves the right to withdraw the designation or name if, in the sole opinion of the University, the person, family, or organization has come into disrepute in the University or in the general community so as to reflect negatively or adversely upon the University.

- 2) If the donor fails to maintain payments on a pledge upon which the naming was bestowed, the naming may be revoked or any other agreed upon obligation.
- 3) If a planned gift upon which the naming was bestowed does not result in the value agreed upon, the naming may be revoked.
- 4) If the name of a corporate or individual donor has been changed.
- 5) The donor's actions no longer align with the mission of the University and its fundamental values, or such actions bring disrepute to the University.

#### VI. Duration and Modification of Namings

- A. The duration of a donor's or honoree's name on any Facility or Program ordinarily continues for as long as the facility or unit is used in the same manner or for the same purpose for which the naming occurred. Any naming made pursuant to this Policy shall remain in effect until such time as the University determines the facility has exceeded its useful life or the facility's continued use has become impossible or impractical or until removed as set forth in Section V above. Upon demolition, replacement, substantial renovation, redesignation of purpose, or similar modification of a named Facility or Program, the University may deem that the naming period has concluded.
  - The appropriate University representative will make all reasonable efforts to inform in advance the original donors or honorees or their surviving family members when the naming period is deemed to have concluded.
  - 2) The University may, but is not required to, provide for the appropriate perpetuation of the previous name. Perpetuation of the original name in an equivalent manner is not required. Appropriate perpetuation of previous names may include, for instance, a plaque in or adjacent to new and renovated facilities.
- B. Term Naming In appropriate instances, a naming may be granted for a pre-determined fixed term, usually 3-10 years. At the end of the term, the name of the Facility or Program shall expire but may be renewed with the same or a new name. The gift agreement should clearly specify the period of time for which the facility or unit will be named.
- C. Joint or Hyphenated Naming Additional names may be added to a Facility or Program unless prohibited by the original donor's gift agreement, in recognition of an additional gift even if the prior donor's or honoree's naming period has not concluded. Hyphenation of names is one method for jointly naming a facility or program.
