Engagement was also high, with over 240 students completing forms early and actively connecting with RAs and peers. "They're already chatting, requesting game nights, and building community," Smith added.

FAMU OPENS VENOM LANDING, A NEW ERA IN CAMPUS HOUSING

TALLAHASSEE, Fla.: Florida A&M University cut the ribbon on Venom Landing, a state-of-the-art, 700-bed residence hall, marking a significant milestone in the university's efforts to expand and modernize on-campus housing.

The new facility at Osceola Street and South Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard boosts FAMU's residential capacity from roughly 2,700 to more than 3,400 beds. University officials say the expansion has eliminated the housing waitlist for the first time in years.

"This is more than just a building — it's a bold step forward in our commitment to provide a vibrant, enriching, and supportive community for our students," said President Marva Johnson during the ceremony.

Former FAMU President Larry Robinson, Ph.D., echoed those sentiments, emphasizing the role housing plays in student success. "Venom Landing provides a space where students can truly feel at home, build meaningful connections with their peers, and excel academically," he said.

The project was designed with student input, from the furnishings to the floor plan. Dr. William Hudson Jr., Vice President of Student Affairs, called the hall "a labor of love," adding, "We thank University Housing and the staff, as well as the students who were integral in helping decide the furniture and design."

Students moving in said they were impressed with the upgrades. Resident Assistant Nasze West said she was excited for her first year in the new space. "Having my own bathroom feels like such a change. It feels very homey. I love the communal areas — the study rooms, the kitchens, the spaces where we can all have fun together. It just seems very welcoming."

Another RA, Emily Williams Gonzalez, noted how Venom Landing builds on the best aspects of FAMU's other halls. "The design encourages gathering, communication, and building a strong community," she said.

With its modern design, communal lounges, kitchens, and dedicated study spaces, Venom Landing intends to strengthen student life and academic performance.

For University Housing, the hall represents expanded capacity and a renewed commitment to community. "This is a new chapter for FAMU Housing," one staff member noted. "Venom Landing shows our students that they are the story."

A Record-Breaking Week

This summer's Move-In Week was one for the books. With the opening of Venom Landing, a state-of-the-art 700-bed residence hall, Florida A&M University welcomed more than 3,000 students to campus, officially eliminating the Housing waitlist for the first time in years. The addition of Venom Landing increased on-campus housing capacity from 2,700 to over 3,400, ensuring that every Rattler who wanted to live on campus had a space to call home.

"We're excited. This is the most exciting time of the year, seeing the students come back and welcoming new ones," said Dr. William Hudson Jr., VP of Student Affairs.

A Presidential Welcome

FAMU's new leader, President Marva B. Johnson, joined Housing staff, students, and families on the ground. President Johnson, dressed in spirited orange and green Converse, greeted incoming Rattlers, participated in check-in, and even received a symbolic key as part of her #FangsAroundTheWorld Move-In experience.

"I'm so inspired to see our students and families coming together from around the world to be part of the FAMULY," President Johnson shared while touring Venom Landing.

- New Capacity: Venom Landing opened quickly, easing housing pressure and eliminating the waitlist.

- Student-Centered Marketing: Authentic photos and videos captured during move-in will fuel Housing's campaigns from Rattler Spaces to wall wraps and digital signage.
- Community Partnerships: Campus partners and local leaders showed up to ensure students felt supported from day one.

Looking Ahead

With the energy of Move-In fueling the start of the year, Housing is preparing for more community-centered events this fall, including pop-up shoots, the Room Decorating Contest, refreshed programming for residents and new episodes of Rattler Spaces.

"Move-In is just the beginning. It's our chance to show students that they are not just residents, they're family," said a Housing staff member.

In short: Move-In 2025 set the tone for a year of excellence, representation, and community. From expanded Housing to heartfelt welcomes, the Highest of Seven Hills proved again why it's always a great day to be a Rattler.
